2019 Annual Summary

The Mooresville Park & Recreation District presents the 2019 Annual Report for review.

The Park employed 147part-time and six full-time employees in 2019. We also maintain more than 25 buildings and structures and over 200 acres.

The second annual concert series took place at Bicentennial Park. There were seven concerts, plus one Sunday afternoon concert.

Pioneer Park held many special events, including Old Settlers, Mooresville Firework Celebration, and Touch a Truck. The Mooresville Aquatic Center celebrated its 30th Anniversary.

The Before and After School Program, in partnership with the Mooresville School Corporation continues to provide a valuable service to the community. In 2019, the Park awarded each school \$10,000 for playground improvement.

Completed projects include repaving trails and parking lots.

The two properties off County Line Road were purchased to add four additional acres to Pioneer Park.

The Park & Recreation District Board and its employees welcome the citizen's suggestions of the programs and facilities that the District operates and maintain. This report intends to serve as an annual review of the Mooresville Park & Recreation District.




